

CHANGES TO HIGH STREET LAYOUT



Maintaining a 2m distance from others is a particular challenge in our narrow pavement outside the shops in the High Street. The parking spaces which have been blocked off are to allow safe distance queuing outside the Post Office and the Pharmacy whilst at the same time allowing space for pedestrians going past. Queuing for the Co-op is probably best done down Vicarage Street whilst the wider pavement outside Tescos allows space outside the shop. Once the cafes/restaurants/pubs are allowed to open, social distancing will be hard to maintain inside the premises and most do not have outside spaces, but we have said the Memorial Green can be used by the cafes if needed and provided MKC give the necessary permission to them. We would encourage as many as possible in the local area to use the Shoppers Car Park rather than park on the High Street to allow more space for safe social distancing to be achieved on the High Street, given our narrow pavement.

Now, more than ever, as more of our shops reopen, it is vital that you support them as the costs of Covid and preparing for reopening safely have been near to bringing several into complete closure. As Joanna from Kings Road Fashions quoted in an article for the Federation of Small Businesses: "use it or lose it" is a sentiment that needs to prevail now. She also says she has been delighted at the positive reactions to reopening that she has received from customers.

PLANNING MATTERS

These continue, despite Covid 19, and there are some which will affect many of you and which you should consider responding to if you are concerned.

- Aspley Hill parking bays. Central Beds have made an application to make what were trial bays permanent. We know many of you wrote to complain when these bays went in, but you must now write again to respond to the formal application. The application number is A00042 and must be quoted in all correspondence. Full details are on our website. If you wish to respond in writing, please address your comments to Mr Coiffait at Priory House, Chicksands, Shefford, SG17 5TQ or do so by email as per our website details. Deadline 10 July.
- Consultation on changes to parking in Station Road. This involves the extension of double yellow lines to stretches of Station Road which Milton Keynes Council is suggesting, largely as a result of a resident's request. It may not suit everyone! Details are on our website, and those particularly affected should have received letters from MKC.
- Swan Hill Homes have sent a letter to most residents about a proposal to build 130 homes off Newport Road on the field south of Frosts Garden Centre. If you didn't get the letter, it is on our website. The Town Council will be opposing this very strongly at every opportunity and keep you aware of the application once it comes in.

Residents will know that the area between Woburn Sands and Bow Brickhill has

been designated for the development of about 3,000 houses in Plan MK (known as SEMK). It was recognised in the plan that this development would not be able to come forward until the route of the proposed expressway was determined. Following the Government's decision to pause the expressway in this area in order to allow thought to be given to upgrading specific pinch points in the existing road network, pressure has mounted to produce a Development Framework for SEMK (which is required before any planning applications can be considered). This cannot be produced until there is a long term strategic transport plan and MKC started on this process at the end of 2019. At around the same time responsibility for the Bedford-Bletchley railway was transferred from Network Rail to the new company previously established to develop the Bedford-Cambridge sector (East West Rail). They have started to investigate the future of the railway crossings at Woburn Sands and Bow Brickhill and MKC have joined forces with them to ensure compatibility between the road and rail infrastructure. It is understood that EWR hope to produce their recommendations on the crossings by September which will need wider discussion to enable consideration to be given to the overall transport structure. Only once this has been completed will substantive discussions on the Development Framework on SEMK be possible. In the meantime the Town Council is arguing strongly that no additional traffic should be allowed through Woburn Sands, and that there should be a significant buffer zone between the current boundary of the town and the new SEMK development.

DO YOU KNOW WHO YOUR CHILDREN ARE SPEAKING TO ONLINE?



During lockdown, many of us are turning online to stay in touch and this goes for children as well as adults. Sadly, some criminals are using these

extraordinary circumstances as a way to exploit and target young people when they are online.

Thames Valley Police have seen an increase in reports of online sexual abuse involving children since movement restrictions were introduced and are urging parents to take this opportunity to have honest conversations about online safety with their children and to review privacy settings on the apps and social networks that they are using.

To support parents during COVID-19, the National Crime Agency's Child Exploitation and Online Protection division are producing fortnightly activity packs to help discuss staying safe online with your children. It does not have cooking facilities, but there is a fridge, urn, kettle and plenty of mugs. The rooms are ideal for pilates, yoga, small group meetings, whist drives, bridge, bingo and much more.
