Miss D Davis spoke on an issue with the pavements, they are a trip hazard, MKCC do some repairs but not complete the whole street, she asked why the work cannot all be done in one go rather than keep returning. Miss Davis understands this is for MKCC but the council will pass on her concerns. Also reported a drain appears blocked at the top of the High Street.
- 173/25 Woburn Sands Festival Feedback and request for public consultation: A resident wanted to raise some issues regarding the live outdoor music in Woburn Sands over the Bank Holiday weekend, specifically the Weathercock Inn, and the impact of the noise on local residents. The resident commented the event appeared well run but suggested ways to better manage noise pollution. There was some discussion with councillors pointing out the large number of attendees who enjoy the festival and that it has been running since 2012 with very few issues or complaints. While acknowledging the concerns about noise, it is Central Bed Council and MK Council who are responsible for pubs licensing and outdoor entertainment.

The resident was thanked for her positive comments and compliments on the appearance of the town.

Over £4000 was raised for local charities. This year Girl Pack and National Animal Welfare Trust (formerly HULA) were the chosen recipients.

Congratulations to Gill Brooke and her magnificent team. All are volunteers and work throughout the year to bring the show together. Artists appeared for free.

- **Invitation to Burlington Hall** Thanks to the initiative set by Cllr Keith Temple I have been invited as Mayor to visit the residents of Burlington Hall on 12th September.
- Invitation extended to Matthew Barber Police & Crime Commissioner I am pleased to report that the Police and Crime Commissioner has accepted our invitation to visit Woburn Sands for a walk around and will be here on 30th September.



Tour of Britain Cycle Race (and news report published in advance of the race) – The rain stopped just in time and last parked car removed as the peloton sped through the town on 4 September. Hundreds of local students from Swallowfield and Fulbrook provided a rousing celebration to this one in a generation event.

Both the town clerk and I sent out media releases promoting the town in advance of the race passing through and I did interviews with BBC and Horizon Radio in advance.

- Flooding More exceptional heavy rain on Wednesday 3 September impacted the all too regular places Aspley Hill, Downham Road, Vicarage Street, High Street (Co-op), and Cranfield Road. Having notified the teams at MKCC, I attended the town in the afternoon and again in the evening where I also spoke to the tams preparing to work through the night to mechanically sweep the Woburn Sands/Bow Brickhill Road in advance of the Cycle Race.
- **Recruitment of new Town Clerk** I am delighted to report that applications have now closed prompting a strong field of candidates and interviews are underway.
- As Mayor of Woburn Sands, I visited Woughton Community Council on 29th July to review the work that council has done to address flooding issues in their parish. Information from that visit was

shared shortly after that date with fellow councillors and others concerned about similar issues in our town.

- As Mayor of Woburn Sands, I have accepted an invitation to attend the MKCC Mayor Civic Service on 12th October.
- As Mayor of Woburn Sands, I have accepted an invitation to attend The High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire Justice Service on Friday 3rd October.
- Summerlin Drive parking concerns As Chairman (Mayor) following concerns regarding road safety and parking issues on Summerlin Drive and in line with MKCC Highways guidance I wrote to all residents of Summerlin Drive and the streets off Summerlin Drive. The responses have been collated (six in total) and forwarded to MKCC Highways requesting appropriate measures be considered.

Update from your Unitary Councillor – September 2025



Welcome back after the summer break.

It's time to contemplate what we can expect over the coming few months in terms of government announcements and how they will impact our local community. I was reading a piece in a national newspaper over the summer setting just how the development of Universal Studios near Kempston Hardwick will fundamentally alter our local economy here in MK transforming it into very much of a Leisure based economy offering both opportunities and challenges for us all in the coming decade.

The 2050 Local Plan (MK2050)

MK City Council comments that in the light of the many responses to the Regulation 18 plan and ongoing evidence base work, they have moved the consultation back to November - December 2025. A delegated decision to consider approving the final draft (Regulation 19) consultation and the subsequent submission of the MKCP is planned for 28 October 2025. The city council still intend to submit the plan in March 2026.

We can expect an announcement from MK City Council in late September / early October and of particular interest to Woburn Sands will be ...

- 1. Will site 3000 dwelling designation for land east of Newport Road be retained (with an extensive parkland area) but not developed before 2038.
- 2. What designation might the city council place on the Greensand Ridge to protect its integrity and amenity value.
- 3. Will the expansion areas include the expansion site south and west of Caldecotte and Bow Brickhill be included and for how many more houses.

East West Rail

The government has announced that it will be making an announcement (via the East West Rail company) in November regarding much more detail relating to the project and the associated infrastructure.

It maintains that it is aware of the concerns of local people regarding the future of local stations and whether Bow Brickhill station will survive, the actual position of local stations, possible closures of level crossings and the development of bridges etc. However, being aware and listening to local people may be two different things as the terms of the Infrastructure and Planning Bill make their way towards becoming legislation ...

The Infrastructure and Planning Bill

The government maintains that the purpose of the Planning and Infrastructure Bill (PIB) is to speed up and streamline the delivery of new homes and critical infrastructure projects across England and Wales by reforming the planning system. Key aims include accelerating housing approvals, minimizing delays for infrastructure, enhancing planning transparency, creating a nature restoration levy, and strengthening the powers of development corporations. The bill also seeks to address issues like water and nutrient neutrality, which have stalled development in certain areas.

In effect, the Planning and Infrastructure Bill will significantly reduce opportunities for public consultation on major infrastructure projects by removing the statutory preapplication consultation requirements for Development Consent Orders (DCOs), which include projects like roads, railways, and windfarms. This change aims to streamline the planning process, speed up delivery, and reduce opportunities for legal challenges, though it has raised concerns about reduced environmental protections and democratic accountability.

What this means in real terms is fewer opportunities to comment on planning issues, especially strategic planning issues such as East West Rail and the Local Plan.

Highways officers are offering a drop-in session for MKCC ward councillors in advance of the next MKCC Full Council meeting on Wednesday 17 September so if WSTC members have highways issues they wish me to raise please let me know in advance of the meeting.



MK City Plan 2050

Following the consultation on the draft Milton Keynes City Plan 2050 (MKCP 2050) that took place between July and October 2024, we have been reviewing the comments received and updating and finalising our evidence base to shape the final draft MKCP 2050.

We received around 7,000 comments on the Regulation 18 Plan and are continuing to work with stakeholders as the MKCP 2050 is being finalised. We are also checking and refining

the proposed policies and allocations in the MKCP 2050. MKCP 2050 must be based on comprehensive and up to date evidence, and we cannot progress without this. As we are still awaiting completion of our transport modelling, we have had to reconsider the timings for the next stages.

Previously we intended to consult on a final version of the MKCP 2050 between September and October 2025, before submitting the Plan for independent examination in March 2026. While the intended submission date has not changed, we are now planning to consult on the final draft MKCP 2050 between November and December 2025.

A delegated decision to consider approving the final draft (Regulation 19) consultation and the subsequent submission of the MKCP is planned for 28 October 2025. Please see the Council's Forward Plan for more information: Forward plan- Executive Decisions (including Key Decisions). This means that we have had to rearrange the event that we had planned to hold on 10 September, this will now be held on 5 November. This event is open to both MKCC Councillors and Town and Parish Councils. The session will cover details about the final draft of the MK City Plan and its consultation. Informed by comments made during the draft Plan (Regulation 18) stage and the finalised evidence, the final draft MK City Plan 2050 (also known as Regulation 19, or 'proposed submission') will be published for consultation for six weeks.

Due to capacity, as before spaces will be limited to 2 attendees per Town & Parish Council, more details will be sent out nearer the time including how to register for the session.



Snippets

- The benches close to the library are back in place and fixed to the ground with (hopefully) stronger fixings.
- There were comments on Facebook about Dott/ Lime bikes and scooters, and some information that they are being dumped because of a £10 charge once in Woburn Sands. The recent situation is as a result of a mistake by MKCC and Dott/ Lime to change the accessibility to WS without actually consulting with WSTC. That is why there currently is not a place to park and position bikes/ scooters, but WSTC are working on clarifying this situation.
- The next meeting of the SEMK Stakeholder Group is likely to be held on 12 November at 5.30 pm. Venue to be decided.
- Household Support Fund funding for Parishes. MKCC has made a funding offer to WSTC

As previously agreed, the town clerk has asked CAB for a quote and availability, and they have quoted per session. The funding should be used with the aim of preventing poverty locally and building local resilience and support.

Delays

The National Infrastructure and Services Transformation Authority has issued their annual report for 2024/25 having reviewed progress on Government projects.

The DfT spent £175.3m on East West Rail against a budget of £90.2m -a 94.3% overspend. EWR was assessed as amber with significant issues to be resolved and slower progress than anticipated and uncertainties about deliverability and funding from the Treasury. The next stages from Bletchley to Cambridge are costed at £3.97b with completion in 2030 although a Development Consent Order needs to be obtained.

The current scheme from Bicester to Milton Keynes spent £125m against a budget of £118m. There are concerns over the delays to the start of services. This was due to the delay in awarding the contract to run the services to Chiltern Railways and for agreement with the trade unions on the operation of the service which has delayed driver training. It is hoped services can still start in 2025.

Hidden Toil Behind Shiny Fronts:

experiences of living in a new housing area with little income OU Research Report published in July 2025

In a bid to resolve the UK's housing crisis, the government is planning to build 1.5 million homes by 2029 and establish up to 12 New Towns before the next election. The OU sponsored research in Milton Keynes, one of the fastest growing cities and one that is often hailed as one of the most successful New Towns, reveals that new housing areas offer a two-tiered experience with low-income residents often drawing the short straw. The research draws on experiences of residents in Glebe Farm and Eagle Farm South, amongst others.

To avoid the city bursting at its seams and new housing areas trapping low-income residents in a life of precarity rather than move them out of it, the report calls on national government and local authorities to work with developers and other stakeholders to:

- Prioritise the establishment of vital services, including schools, health facilities and shops, to serve new and existing residents within reasonable distance;
- Ensure that public transport links are established as soon as new housing areas are being developed to offer affordable and viable ways of travelling around the city;
- Construct community buildings with ample capacity to meet communities' needs, and ensure temporary facilities are provided until permanent facilities are available;
- Invest in community development to build an inclusive and thriving community;
- Hold housing associations to account for lack of responsiveness or inadequate response to faults or complaints;
- Meaningfully enable the participation of voluntary, community organisations and resident groups before and throughout the development of new housing areas to understand the needs of all residents, and especially those on lower incomes.

MK City Council Local Transport Plan

Officers have been preparing the new Local Transport Plan 5 document for the last 18

months, in response to a Department for Transport (DfT) call for all local authorities to update their transport plans in the light of new national focus on public transport, active travel and the decarbonisation of transport.

The draft document has been developed in the context of the Council's own plans and policies, including MK:2050 Strategy, the Sustainability Strategy and the Local Plan and in the context of wider national guidance on transport policy, such as Decarbonising Transport, and the emerging Integrated Transport Strategy.

The LTP has an extensive evidence base, which sets out our current baseline in terms of modal share and use of the transport system in MK and has also been informed by an extensive public consultation exercise which commenced in Summer 2024 which received over 5,000 responses covering all aspects of our transport system. This information, along with the councils own MK strategies and national policy guidance have been used to inform the suggested policies in the LTP5 document.

The consultation will run for a period of 12 weeks and will start in the first week of September.

Following the consideration of the draft LTP5 document by the Environment and Place Scrutiny Committee in June, an accessible summary document for public consultation has now been prepared and is attached.

The agreement to proceed to consultation will be made on Tuesday of next week and then an eight week consultation will commence.

Some headlines emerging from the briefing to parishes perhaps include...

- Link to MK2050 Local Plan
- The city can no longer rely on country lanes
- The network is decaying especially bridges
- Stronger parking enforcement is planned
- All parking surplus monies will be invested in transport
- Plan to reduce grid road speeds
- Plan to introduce average speed cameras
- MKCC will obtain camera enforcement powers in November of this year
- Car cruising is a major issue operation Chromium addressing the issues with TVP

- MK Metro network in place by 2030 (see slide above and the document itself)
- MK Connect will have driverless vehicles in the near future with enormous cost savings enabling expansion of the network
- New Towns Taskforce discussing with MKCC funding of the new MK Connect Services
- Council planning to take on transport franchising powers can offer cross subsidised services
- Smart ticketing is coming
- And finally chord ... which is apparently the project that will enable trains coming from MK Central to join the East West Rail network without reversing or people having to change trains (Denbigh Hall Junction project)



Britain Cycle Race

The Lloyds Tour of Britain is the largest free-to-attend sporting spectacle in the UK. Thursday 4 September saw stage three of Britain's biggest professional cycle race starting in Milton Keynes; a 122.8-kilometre (76.4-mile) leg from Milton Keynes to Ampthill, that will take in Woburn, Toddington, Barton-le-Clay, and Shefford, and include a spectator friendly double-loop around Northill and Old Warden.

Stage three begun at Milton Keynes' Midsummer Boulevard at 11:30, where special activities will be happening for spectators, crossing Campbell Park before heading south on grid roads, leaving the H7 Chaffron Way for a long stretch on the V10 Brickhill Street, passing the Open University headquarters and the Oracle Red Bull Racing Formula One technology campus before racing to Woburn Sands and on into Central Bedfordshire. The stage finishes in Ampthill town centre at around 14:40.
